## Sentence Completion 1

## Introduction

The Verbal Reasoning section of the GRE® General Test contains three types of questions:

- Reading Comprehension
- Text Completion
- Sentence Equivalence

Text Completion and Sentence Equivalence questions are independent. At INSPIRUS, we use the nomenclature "SENTENCE COMPLETION" to refer to both these question types.

## Sentence Completion 1

## Text Completion

Text Completion questions omit crucial words from short passages and ask the test taker to use the remaining information in the passage as a basis for selecting words or short phrases to fill the blanks and create a coherent, meaningful whole.

## Format:

- A passage composed of one to five sentences
- One to three blanks
- Three answer choices per blank (five answer choices in the case of a single blank)
- The answer choices for different blanks function independently
- All required answers for a question must be right to fetch a score


## Sentence Completion 1

## Sentence Equivalence

The questions consist of a single sentence with just one blank, and they ask you to find two choices that lead to a complete, coherent sentence while producing sentences that mean the same thing.

## Format:

- A single sentence
- One blank
- Six answer choices
- Requires you to select two of the answer choices

No credit for partially correct answers

## Strategy for Text Completion and Sentence Equivalence

## Inspirus ${ }^{66}$ RIPE ${ }^{99}$ strategy

- Read through the sentence/passage to get an overall sense of it.
- Identify the linking words and the key words and understand the central idea of the sentence/passage.
- Predict an answer that can fit in the blank and look for a similar word among the options.
- Eliminate the options that do not match with the predicted answer.
